An Epiphanytide Message

One of my greatest laments about urban dwelling is how the streetlights wash out the night sky. Instead of the stars, we get an electric glow that casts an awkward light in our windows at night. I find the little bits of streetlight that illuminate my bedroom highly annoying, but in a funny way, it reminds me of the great Epiphany theme: light in the darkness.

During this season, there are three great feasts that speak about light. There are the Magi who follow the star at Epiphany to the baby Jesus; Simeon who declares Jesus a light for the whole world at Candlemas; and, the dazzling radiance of the transfigured Jesus atop a mountain. In all cases, the theme points us to what St. John writes in Scripture: "that Jesus is the light of the world."



I have a funny memory from Taizé connected to light. In Europe, it is a common practice that the Scouts will go to Bethlehem and draw from a candle in a grotto under the Church of the Nativity the Light of Peace. It is then carried back to Europe and spread throughout the various countries. The idea behind the light is to signify the light of Christ as peace, which is distributed to as many people as possible. I find this both a fragile and beautiful message.

It is fragile because the light from a candle is easily extinguished. But it is beautiful because when it is shared the light does not diminish the original candle. Instead, they both grow together. Unfortunately, when I was in Taizé, someone unfamiliar with the Light of Bethlehem, accidentally blew the candle out at the end of evening prayer. A brother quickly arrived on the scene and said, 'light it again.' It was an unintentional mistake, but the uniqueness of a light brought all the way back from Bethlehem was gone. Only much later did I come to appreciate that in the journey of faith, there are truly moments when the light of Christ must be lit anew in us.

Seasons like Epiphany invite us to reflect on how the light of Christ is lit in us and most importantly, it invites us to share that light with others. When I think of the sharing of the light of Christ, I look at all the ways in which the people of this parish are preparing themselves for ministry on the Hill. Once again, through your generosity we have fully funded another year of Transfig the Hill with \$42,500 in donations set aside. This is an incredible achievement.

The parish leadership cannot say it enough: thank you! Your pledges allows us to continue our ministries on the Hill that focus on sharing the light of Christ. And we want to share that light through Music and Movie Nights, and services such as Water's Edge and Campfire Compline. It supports new family focused initiatives like Tots at Transfig and First Fridays. This generosity shines a way forward for our parish in 2024 and shines a way for others to see God through the power of Christ working in our midst. In communion, Michael.

Due to an overwhelming response from the community, TNO opened a food bank to the public, serving residents of Thorncliffe and Flemingdon Park. The Food Collaborative now serves over 1,100 clients, ensuring they have access to food twice a month.

January Reading WE LOVE BOOKS


VINO ET VELLUM THE GREAT DIVORCE BY C.S. LEWIS



LET'S TALK ROMANS WITH DR. COLLEEN SHANTZ FEBRUARY 18, 12:15-1:30PM

Dr. Colleen Shantz has held a teaching position in the Faculty of Theology at Regis St. Michael's since 2003 and is cross-listed to the Department for the Study of Religion in the University of Toronto. Her research explores the general category of experience as an important element in the texts of the New Testament, and in early Christianity and Mediterranean antiquity more generally.



On the Feast of Candlemas, we had a special liturgy to dedicate a picture frame of the burning of the mortgage. In going through our archives, Russell Smith identified a picture which we decided to re-frame and mount on the Narthex wall. The picture captures an important moment of Transfig history.

On February 6th of 1949, the original mortgage was burned after the \$80,000 was paid off. In the Anglican tradition, a church cannot be dedicated by a bishop until its debts are paid off. When this happens there is a Feast of the Dedication during which a bishop dedicates the church building. I guess that we can imagine it as a really long soft opening for the first 18 years of the parish before the grand opening!

A few weeks before the new year, while I was sitting at home doing my daily journaling, this phrase floated through my mind: *Harvest Year*. What would a harvest year look like, I wondered. Certainly, it looks different for each person, but for me I knew the phrase was connected to this new opportunity to join the staff team at Transfig.

As Creative Worship Coordinator, I have already had a basketful of experiences with this community. For instance, I love the spontaneity of the Children's Chapel – I never know who or what to expect. Each child brings something new to the songs, as when we found ourselves singing once, "He's got firetrucks and hovercrafts in His hands, He's got the whole world in His hands..."

I have also enjoyed the intimacy of the Water's Edge service, sitting in a circle and facing each other as we pray, listen and sing. I've even had the chance to be initiated into a Water's Edge Big Cook Day, spending a morning in the kitchen chopping and peeling and simmering sauces with a dozen talented cooks.

One of my favourite parts of being a worship leader is listening to scripture and to the Spirit in order to select songs that will bring praise bubbling up in our hearts. I get excited when I hit upon the "perfect" song, and then disappointed when I realize it's too complicated for me to play on the guitar well. In this role, I have become well-acquainted with my limitations. And there is joy in this, too. And so I keep hunting, remembering, and discovering until I uncover another tune to bring along on the journey. I read this verse in Isaiah 9 recently:

They will be glad in Your presence As with the gladness of harvest, As men rejoice when they divide the spoil.

There is an item that I found in the children's chapel that perfectly symbolizes my gladness in God's harvest and my eagerness to share the bounty of God's presence. It is a beautiful wicker basket filled with colourful percussion instruments. You may have seen me with the basket, handing out egg shakers, maracas, bells and drumsticks. For me, these instruments are the spoils of joy! And when I pass them around and the congregation joins me in shaking and tapping and singing together, it's like sitting down at a table to enjoy a great feast.
